Accomplishments

- Cared for more than 50 tigers, lions, cougars, caracals, servals, bobcats, kinkajous, coati mundis, a porcupine, and red wolves.
- Introduced a new species, the red wolf. This is our first animal that is part of a Species Survival Plan.
- Rescued 5 animals (Pixie Serval, Haiku Serval, Molly Bobcat and Mist & Caroline Red Wolves).
- Continued to implement a new sanctuary infrastructure plan, added additional feeding chutes and lock-outs. Moved the tour fence closer to the sanctuary and made other improvements to the fence and gates.
- Added a small educational mobile building.
- Raised funds to purchase a new transport truck and specialized trailer for large cat rescues.
- Made our tours more accessible with the addition of an 8-seat golf cart.
- Hired our new Executive Director, Kris Marino.
- Held our largest year of summer camp with 5 sessions and over 70 kids.
- Hired a 4th keeper to continue to ensure the highest level of care in light of new, diverse animals in our care.

Meet Mist and Caroline Red Wolves

In April 2022, Carolina Tiger Rescue was the 50th facility to join the Red Wolf Species Survival Plan (RWSSP) by welcoming two beautiful wolves. Both females are a vital part of the RWSSP, a set of extensive conservation measures and activities designed to ensure the longevity and security of red wolves as a species. Carolina Tiger's role in the RWSSP is to help free up space at other facilities for the continuation of the breeding program at other facilities. Mist and Caroline live in the back of the Sanctuary (off-tour) where it's peaceful and quiet and does not get a lot of activity. They love meat treats that consist of food they'd only find in the wild, such as rats, rabbits, deer meat, and squirrels!

After a tumultuous few decades, the RWSSP reports that there are now approximately 20 to 30 individuals left in the wild in eastern North Carolina, and a little more than 200 individuals in captivity. Red wolves are critically important to our ecosystem and could help control the overpopulation of a number of invasive species were they to return to and thrive in their native environment. This is why we're so passionate about doing our part to help them survive!



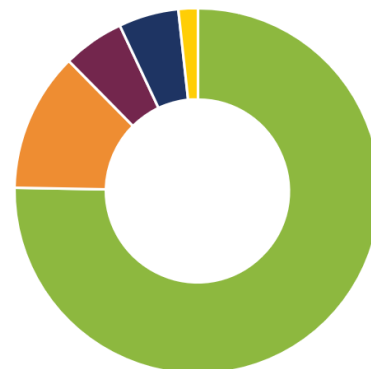
